

From our interim Pastor



The gospel According to...?

Luke (mostly)! Why? Because this is Revised Common Lectionary year C, meaning that many churches not all but many are following a common set of readings through the Gospel of Luke from now until November 22 at the end of the Christian year.

The transition from the Christmas season to the season of Epiphany happens on January 5 when we hear from Matthew (of all people) about the Magi arriving in Bethlehem with their gifts. They also came with a great deal of uncertainty. That means that they were asking questions, and they were open to surprising answers. They certainly received a surprising answer in a dream! Rather than going back to Herod with information about where the Christ Child is, they turned and went home by another way.

The next Sunday is Baptism of Christ; we will hear the voice of God say, "This is my beloved son, in whom I am well-pleased." The season continues as we hear the story of the call of the disciples and some of their ministries and missions before it ends on—oh my goodness!—March 2 with the story of the transfiguration. We will hear God's voice say again, "This is my beloved son, in whom I am well-pleased" and then God says, "Listen to him!"

This is when the disciples really began to understand that their stories were intertwined with the story of Jesus. They could each have written a *Gospel According to*... and though their stories might be similar, think how different Peter's gospel would be from Matthew's or John's from Thomas'. Ultimately, every person who comes to The Way of Christ has a Gospel to share. We may only have four Gospels in the New Testament canon, but there are a lot of *Gospels According to*... floating around and not all of them are about Jesus' earthly ministry.

In the United Church of Christ, we believe that "God is still speaking..." That means our stories of lives changed by encounters with God, Jesus Christ, and/or the Holy Spirit are part of the continuing testament and we each have a Gospel story to tell.

I wonder what stories the Gospel According to the Congregational Church of Seekonk might tell. And when I have a wonderment, I really like to know answers, so I'm inviting you to tell me your story or stories about how your life has been changed because you encountered God, Jesus Christ, and/or the Holy Spirit here, with the people you met here, or because you did something, like go to Haiti, because you attend SCCUCC. You can share your Gospel story here: <u>https://forms.gle/97QQTjBAF1ExzKeX7</u> and you can keep it between us, allow me to share it anonymously, or allow me to share it with credit to you. You can share as many stories as you'd like and you can choose the level of sharing for each story individually by submitting them separately. I'll collect stories through this season of Epiphany and then use what I learn in the season after Easter.

Fair warning: I <u>might</u> ask if you'd be wiling to share your story personally if you don't put restrictions on it, but I won't pressure anyone to do so. It can be one thing to write down our testimony and something completely different to speak it in front of people.

I hope many of you will take the time to share your story with me. Even if no one gives me permission to share, your stories will help to guide me as we begin to work on the church's leadership needs and prepare to write the profile.

But I do hope that some of you will be courageous enough to allow me to share and even to be willing to share your own story because we wouldn't be here if the people who first encountered Jesus had never told their stories. Our stories are just as powerful, and we need not keep silent about the ways that God has changed our lives through this congregation.

Thanks to Trish Sweeney and all that helped with the November clean-up of the outside grounds. Many families and young people made quick work of a large job.

Winter is upon us and hopefully we don't get much snow this year. If we do, we would be very thankful for anyone who could come and help with the shoveling of the walkways and steps leading into the buildings.

Our revenue continues to be down and we still owe money to the Memorial Fund for money we needed to borrow to make some urgent repairs. We will begin the budgeting process for the fiscal year 2025/2026 in the next few months.

Repairs were made on the bridge leading to the Gardner Building which was power washed and stained with anti-slip stain to avoid falls. New smoke and carbon monoxide detectors were installed in the Gardner Building according to code.

Some good news! Thanks to a very generous donor, ceiling fans will be installed in the Sanctuary in the next couple of weeks. This will help with the circulation both in the Summer months and the distribution of the heat in winter. The money donated will also cover the cost of repairing the air conditioning in the Memorial Room as well.

The annual Trustee/Staff Christmas Party will be held on Monday, December 16th.

The Trustees would like to extend our best wishes for a safe and Happy New Year.

Today's Prayer Shawls are handmade gifts of well wishes, into which blessings and intentions have been lovingly stitched with prayers for the recipient, offering comfort and warmth of a different kind. With this in mind, people who love to knit

and crochet have picked up their needles, hooks and yarn to use their love of their craft to make a thought filled gift for someone special, creating a gift from their heart.

Similar to praying, spiritual practice involves adding prayer or blessings from our minds and hearts to the work in our hands.

Who will receive the Prayer Shawl?

Prayer shawls often begin with a specific person in mind but they may also be inspired by an intriguing stitch pattern or a tempting yarn. Even if we do not have a specific person in mind, as our projects progress, we might learn of someone who is in need of a shawl.

How can you use the time making a Prayer Shawl as a spiritual experience?

To create a peaceful surrounding and to enhance your quiet, reflective knitting time, prepare your shawl-making space by lighting a candle, playing some quiet music and making yourself a cup of tea.

MISSION AND SOCIAL ACTION

Thank you so much to all who contributed food for the UCAP holiday food baskets! It is wonderful that we have been able to continue this project for the UCAP students and families.



UCAP is an independent public school located in Providence,

serving middle school urban students who have fallen behind and need extra help to succeed. The school was created 35 years ago by Rob DeBlois, and the Seekonk Congregational Church has been a supporter for many years.

Thank you also to all who have contributed to the Help the Homeless meals which we provide on a regular basis, and to those who continue to contribute to our own food pantry on the porch. *Right now our food pantry is once again in need of items which require little or no preparation, such as cereal bars, tuna pouches, peanut butter, cracker and cheese kits, etc.*

The next date for making food for Help the Homeless is January 19th. We will be providing a hot meal of chicken, stuffing, and green beans, and will be requesting donations to purchase the chickens.

We continue to collect bottles and cans in our recycling bin. A special thanks to those who sort and count their donations! It is a huge help to the recycling fairies when plastic, glass, and cans are separated and counted! - but we are grateful for every donation! This money goes to Haiti, or to hunger concerns.

The MSA book club (open to everyone) is now reading Rough Sleepers by Tracy Kidder. It is about the homeless population in Boston, and is an eye-opening read. We will be discussing the book at Bonnie DeBlois's house, 380 Prospect Street, Seekonk, on Thursday, February 6th.

For future reference: we hope to begin collecting items to support a women's shelter. More information will follow.
