

### From the Interim Pastor

Spring Training for the Easter Season



I am a baseball fan. My family always managed to find a minor league team to follow wherever we lived when I was a kid and I'm still seething over the Paw Sox departure from my "new" hometown. Spring training was a fun time of year because we could follow some of our favorite players from the farm clubs as they tried, and sometimes accomplished their goal, to make the roster of the major league team.

It also meant that Easter was coming and that I as a follower of Jesus was in Spring Training for the major league work of spreading the Good News of Christ's resurrection. That was never hard for me because Easter is my favorite day of the Christian year. I love Easter because it's the whole reason Christianity even exists. And—because despite what some branches of Christianity want us to believe—it focuses on the women who had the courage to share an outrageous, impossible story that turned out to be true: Jesus, who died on the cross, was alive and waiting to teach his followers even more, and had his sights set on bringing the realm of God to earth. The women showed us how to train for the work from the beginning of Jesus' ministry and they were prepared, unlike the men, to do the work both with and without Jesus around.

Eastertide is a season of mystery, growth, and action. I believe it is one best encountered when we have done the work through Lent and Holy Week to prepare ourselves to encounter the One who said he would be raised on the third day not just once but multiple times throughout his ministry. The time we spend in close prayer and reflection on Jesus' teachings through the 40 days of Lent and the six "little Easter" Sundays is training for the joyful exuberance that animates us to do as the women did so long ago: tell an outrageous, impossible story that turned out to be true. Jesus, who died on the cross, is *still* alive (the mystery), *still* teaching his followers even more (growth), and *still* asking us to build God's realm of heaven as it is on earth (action).

We feast on March 2 with a Mardi Gras celebration, we start Spring Training on Ash Wednesday, March 5, and we need to be ready to work for real on April 20. We've got this!

Good news! If you are tired of winter (like many of us are) Spring is not far away, officially starting on March 20. Before that, however, we will have Ash Wednesday, which falls on March 5, which, fortunately, is a

Wednesday. Remember, we have two great services; noon and 7 PM. And while we are on the subject of church service times, do not forget that Daylight Savings Time begins the following Sunday, March 9.

Ash Wednesday is our warning that the Easter season is coming, starting with Lent. As a reminder, Lent is the solemn Christian religious observance in the liturgical year commemorating the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the desert and enduring temptation by Satan, according to the Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke, before beginning His public ministry. **SUNDAYS IN LENT** will offer us opportunities to reflect on the ways that we can support Seekonk Congregational Church UCC in many ways, particularly through our pledges of financial support for Fiscal Year 2025-2026 as well as gifts of time and talent.

**THURSDAYS IN LENT** will be dedicated days of prayer. Watch for a prayer each Thursday morning aligned to the themes of economic and racial justice featured in Sunday services and the Lenten Seminar conversations shared with our neighbors at Rehoboth Congregational Church UCC.

**SUNDAY, APRIL 6TH** will be "Meet Your Deacon" Sunday. We will all begin in the Sanctuary as usual, then later in worship process to Woodworth Hall, where we will celebrate Communion around tables with our assigned Deacons and then have a time of conversation that allows us to get to know each other better. **PALM SUNDAY, APRIL 13TH** at 9:30AM begins with the Cherub Choir and includes readings from Jesus' time in Jerusalem after his triumphal entry. The service ends with "The Palms" as the children lead us to the Gardiner Building and a Walk Through Holy Week before Coffee Hour in Woodworth Hall.

**MAUNDY THURSDAY, APRIL 17TH** at 7:00PM in the Sanctuary will be the first part of the Tenebrae sequence that leads to Jesus' burial in the tomb, focused on the events of Thursday evening starting with the first celebration of what we call Communion. The service will be in the Sanctuary (Required attendance for 2nd graders and families) (Child Care for young children...let us know if you need it ahead of time, please!)

**GOOD FRIDAY, APRIL 18TH** at 7:30PM in the Sanctuary (please note time difference between Thursday and Friday) service will continue the Tenebrae sequence. It will include the procession of the Cross and the Seven Last Words of Jesus on the Cross.

**EASTER VIGIL** will begin following the Good Friday Service and continue until Easter Dawn. (There is a sign-up sheet on the bulletin board in the hall.) This has been an unforgettable experience for those who have participated - especially in the middle of the night!

### **BOARD OF MISSION & SOCIAL ACTION**



<u>Feed the Homeless</u>: We want to thank all who provided money for chickens or who participated in any way to Feed the Homeless on January 19. This program operates every Sunday at noon in Pawtucket. They serve a hot meal to 100 people or more. Each person is sent home with a cold lunch consisting of 2 sandwiches, a sweet snack, a salty snack, and bottled water. We have been alternating between providing

the hot lunch and the cold lunch every other month. We will be serving a cold lunch in March. When we get the date, we will be asking people to make sandwiches, a sweet snack, or provide a salty snack, or water.

<u>Book Club</u>: We discussed <u>Rough Sleepers</u> by Tracey Kidder last week at Bonnie Deblois' house. Our next book will be <u>A New Earth: Awakening to Your Life's Purpose</u> by Eckhart Tolle. In this book, Tolle shows us how to transcend our ego-based state of consciousness to achieve personal happiness. It is also the key to ending conflict and suffering throughout the world. Tolle describes how our attachment to ego creates dysfunction that leads to anger, jealousy, and unhappiness. He shows the reader how to awaken to a new state of consciousness and follow the path to a truly fulfilling existence. This was Oprah's book club pick a few months ago. ## Some Facts About Lent

The season of Lent began on Ash Wednesday. That day is so named because in the early church ashes were sprinkled on the heads of penitent Christians.

This custom remains today and is becoming more wide spread in the Protestant Churches. The sign of the cross on forehead or in the palm of the hand symbolizes our being open to God and offering ourselves with clean hearts before our God.

The color for Lent is purple, reminding us of Lent's penitential mood.

Lent lasts forty days, until Easter. but if you count the days from Ash Wednesday until Easter Sunday, you get 46. That's because Sundays are excluded from the count (and from Lent). They are designed as "feast days," commemorating the <u>resurrection</u>.

The origin of the word LENT is the Anglo-Saxon word, LENCTEN, meaning "spring", the time when the days lengthen.

In some families there is the tradition of "giving up" something for Lent. That evolved from the idea that Lent was a period of fasting in preparation for baptism which was observed on Easter Eve.

Thankfully, most of us have progressed from the idea of "giving up" (Self denial) to the idea of "taking on" for the good of others.

There are many ways Christians benefit from Lent today. The season encourages us to set aside time for quiet contemplation...to read, meditate, and pray; to reflect on the direction of our own personal lives and on the meaning of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus.

It reminds us that we are a part of a community of faith that makes a profound difference in our lives and in the way we reach out to those near at hand as well as those on the other side of the world.

In short, Lent is a time to reflect on the relationship between our lives and our faith, between Jesus' journey and our own.
